Pastor's Page

Dear Friends,

Two weeks ago, the Sacramento Gay Men's Chorus, which I sing with, sang a song that pulled deeply at my heartstrings. Each time we sang it in rehearsal, tears would well up in my eyes and each time, getting through the song was a difficult experience. As the chorus got better at singing the song, the deeper the feelings of sadness washed over me. When we entered into tech week, the week of full rehearsals of the show prior to the official shows on

Friday and Saturday, the rich, booming chorus and the soloist singing the song were nearly too much for me to take. And yet, I was able to sing the song and keep my composure. After the show, I had to walk home rather than taking an Uber. I needed time to heal my soul from the sadness of that song.

The song is "Love is Christmas." It was written and originally sung by Sara Bareilles and then adapted for Gay Men's Choruses nationwide. Here is a link where you can listen to the Columbus Gay Men's Chorus singing

This song brought up such emotion due to an experience I had with my mother several years before she passed away. At the time, I was living in Cresskill, NJ, serving as the pastor of the Cresskill Congregational Church. One afternoon in early December, I received a call from my mom's pulmonologist. He said that mom had been rushed to the Emergency Room just a few hours earlier and had slipped into a coma. She was not expected to survive. I needed to come home immediately.

I called my church council, and they said to go. I grabbed my robes, prayer book, Bible, and laptop, believing I would be officiating my mom's funeral. I got a plane ticket and flew home the next day. I arrived at the airport and took a taxi directly to the hospital. I walked into a room where the doctor had placed my mom. There she was, laying still in the cold room hooked up to beeping machines. She looked asleep but in an uncomfortable way. A thought hit me. I cried out, "Mom, I'm home!" I always said it when I walked into the front door of the family home, whether coming home from military leave or when I arrived on vacation from either New York or New Jersey. "Mom, I'm home!," I yelled out so she could hear me. And with that, she woke up immediately, turned her head, and said, "Oh David. I am so glad you are here."

Tears welled up in my shocked and surprised eyes. The nurse behind me jumped. She ran from the room and called the doctor. He and other nurses burst into the room. Mom was awake. We spoke for several minutes and I kissed her forehead and said I'd see her later as the doctor ushered me outside. He said it was a miracle. Mom would live for several years and have a few more close calls.

I remember getting into the cab to take me to my brother's house, where I would stay. My heart was trembling and I was sad and grateful. I remember those feelings as I hear or sing this song, Love is Christmas. When I listen to the words, they tell me that Christmas isn't about the toys or the food on the table or being perfect for the holiday season. They say "Love is who we are, and no season can contain it; love would never



fall for that. Let love lead us, love is Christmas." I pray that your holiday season is filled with

love and that you and your loved ones are the center of attention, well, that and Jesus of course. Try not to let the holiday trappings cause you to miss the love, for that is truly the reason for the season.


Music Musings, by Dr. Elliot Jones



The Magnificat, Mary's song upon learning that she will give birth to the Christ child, is this Sunday's scripture text. These words have inspired composers for centuries. On Friday night during Lessons and Carols, Donna Apidone will read the beginning of it, and the choir will sing the rest in J.S. Bach's setting. Sunday's prelude will be the "Prayer to Our Lady" from Suite Gothique by Léon Boëllmann (1862-1897), composed in 1895. The postlude will be one of many fugal variations on a Gregorian chant Magnificat by Johann Pachelbel (1653-1706).

Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924) was one of the first composers to drive, and on one occasion crash, a car. He wrote at least seven settings of the *Magnificat*, but the one in B-flat is particularly joyful, and the choir will sing it as the offertory anthem.

Most of the Christmas carols we'll be doing on Christmas Eve have final verse arrangements and descants by Sir David Willcocks (1919-2015), with whom I studied briefly. These were first published in 1961 in a collection called "Carols for Choirs." Especially famous is what has become known as "The Chord" in *O Come, All Ye Faithful*:



It is a half-diminished seventh chord, not at all uncommon. But, like Wagner's "Tristan chord," it's all about the context: It's placement on the word "Word" after an octave leap in the melody, the ascending outline of the D7 chord that precedes it, and especially the equally tense C-augmented chord that follows it, all combine to create a stunning musical moment. "David Willcocks has transformed our musical celebration of Christmas, and it's hard to imagine now what it must have been like in the BCC era (before 'Carols for Choirs')." -Sir John Rutter

The Pioneer Bells will ring the beloved Christmas carols *O Little Town of Bethlehem* and *Away In a Manger*. The choir will sing *This Christmastide*, written for soprano Jessye Norman in 1988.

Bach's arrangement of the German carol *In Dulci Jubilo* is much like a "toccata," which literally means "to touch," as in touching the keys in fast flourishes like you're improvising. Toward the end, I engage the *Zimbelstern*, a set of small bells that ring when the device they rest on is set in motion. The word means "spinning star," and indeed there are some of these that also have a visible star that spins as the bells do. It is especially appropriate during the Christmas and Epiphany seasons with all of their myriad star references, but can be used at other times of year.



However, there is free parking underground next door/behind the church in the underground car park at the Teichert/Sutter underground parking garage. Enter Capitol Street between the garage and the hospital. The parking gate is open 9:00 AM 12:30 PM on Sundays. You may park in any space, even if it says reserved.

Teichert/Sutter Underground Garage

Free parking on Sundays for Pioneer Church members and visitors! Enter on Capitol Ave btw 27th and 28th Streets, drive down the ramp and park anywhere. The gate remains open until 1 PM. Exit and re-enter through the hospital.

- 麘 Free Street Parking without meters, 2-hour time limit
- * Pay-to-park Sutter Garage, 27th St, 1 block north of N St.



During the weekdays, we have the entire basement level (B2) for our parking needs, but you will need to get a parking card to access the closed gate unless we have prearranged an event for the gates to be open. On-street parking is available where meters are present. If you are willing to walk a couple of blocks, on-street parking with no meters allows for 2-hours of free parking.
