




Pastor's Page

Dear Friends,

For the past few weeks, I've had a heavy heart. With the upcoming Presidential Inauguration and today's politics and the threat of what's going to be standard fare for the next four years is troubling.

The newest stress for me is how so many companies of late are doing away with their Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) training. From Facebook announcing that calling gay and trans-people derisive names will no longer be moderated and therefore now allowed, to McDonald's reimagining the DEI conversation by no longer mentioning it, to Wal-Mart, Ford, and John Deere reducing their DEI commitments, it's like we're taking two steps back in the conversation of equality and justice. And, it's a startling reminder that companies need regulations rather than simply giving them the choice to police themselves.



They are more concerned about their financial situation and less about what is right or just for others. As a result, without laws to protect all Americans, they will only serve their own interests.

On Sunday, I will preach about standing up and voicing prophetic calls for justice and hope in our relationships and communities. Since Monday is Martin Luther King, Jr. day, a federal holiday signed into law by then-President Bill Clinton, my sermon will look to the prophet witness of Dr. King and others who stand up for equity and equality.

More and more, we are witnessing how so many of our friends and family are unjust in matters of equality. Over the last decade, we've watched our Facebook and Twitter feeds explode with comments from our loved ones that rattle our faith and belief in matters of justice. So, in response to their blistering comments and to make peace, many of us have decided to clam up. We have stopped engaging in political conversations because of the stress of those conversations. We clam up. I think there is a time to clam up—but it isn't all the time—it's only sometimes—like over a holiday dinner party. There comes a time when each one of us is called up to confront injustice and bigotry—we need to learn how to be clever in doing so.

I love this Bible quote from Jesus in Matthew 10:16. He was commissioning the Apostles to go out and spread the Gospel's Good News. Jesus said, "Look, I am sending you out as sheep among wolves. So, be as shrewd as snakes and harmless as doves." He also warned them that some people would not like their message, and as a result, they would be persecuted—handed over to courts, arrested, and sometimes even whipped (Matthew 10:17-20). But they should be clever in proclaiming the truth, knowing that the Spirit of God will speak through them.

We all need to share a prophetic witness from time to time to the love of God and how we have this divine responsibility to love others. We don't have to shout or be overtly confrontational. Another way to engage folks is to offer an insightful word or question to those we know, asking and prodding them to find better ways to love their neighbor. I like to use humor, the great defuser, to get across my points. Whatever we do it, we'll be aided by God's power to say the right thing at the right time.


I pray that you will have an opportunity to promote love for others. James Cone once said, "Justice is what love looks like in public." Let us promote justice, hope, and a better way of living—rather than clamming up and allowing the loudest voices to say and do the ugliest things toward others.

Music Musings, by Dr. Elliot Jones

Sunday's prelude was composed by Samuel Coleridge-Taylor (pictured below) who was born in London in 1875 to a British mother and an African father. He took violin lessons, but his prowess as a composer was quickly recognized by his teacher at the Royal College of Music, the esteemed composer and professor Charles Villiers Stanford. It is fun to imagine that *Melody* could easily be a violin or oboe solo with piano or orchestral accompaniment.



The choir will sing the Gospel song *I Was Glad* and Katie O'Rourke will be the soloist in *Oh Thou that Tellest Good Tidings to Zion* from Handel's Messiah. In July of 1717 King George I asked Handel to provide music for a concert on the River Thames. *Water Music* was performed by about fifty musicians on a barge, while the King and his entourage listened from another barge.



This painting, from over 100 years later, romanticizes this event by placing Handel on the same barge as the King! The *Water Music* is divided into three suites of five to seven movements each. I will play the first movement of the second suite, which is scored for alternating trumpets and French horns.


Notice for Annual Meeting 2025



CONTINUING ANNOUNCEMENTS OF THE CHURCH



+ The **church office will be closed** on Monday, January 20 in observance of Martin Luther King, Jr. Day.

+ Where to Park. There is no free metered parking outside around the church. However, there is free parking underground next door/behind the church in the underground car park at the Teichert/Sutter underground parking garage. Enter Capitol Street between the garage and the hospital. The parking gate is open 9:00 AM – 12:30 PM on Sundays. You may park in any space, even if it says reserved.



During the weekdays, we have the entire basement level (B2) for our parking needs, but you will need to get a parking card to access the closed gate unless we have prearranged an event for the gates to be open. On-street parking is available where meters are present. If you are willing to walk a couple of blocks, on-street parking with no meters allows for 2-hours of free parking.
